"Essay on American Scenery" By Thomas Cole, 1836

It *has not* been in vain—the good, the enlightened of all ages and nations, have found pleasure and consolation in the beauty of the rural earth.

The Three Patriarchs Zion National Park

Prophets of old retired into the solitudes of nature to wait the inspiration from heaven. It was on Mount Horeb that Elijah witnessed the mighty wind, the earthquake, and the fire; and heard the "still small voice"—that voice is YET heard among the mountains!

Angels Landing Zion National Park

St. John preached in the desert;--the wilderness is YET a fitting place to speak to God. ...

He who looks on nature with a "loving eye," ... in gazing on the pure creations of the Almighty, ... feels a calm religious tone steal through his mind, and when he has turned to mingle with his fellow men, the chords of which have been struck in that sweet communion cease not to vibrate.

Those scenes of solitude from which the hand of nature has never been lifted affect the mind with a more deep toned emotion than aught which the hand of man has touched. Amid them the consequent associations are of God the creator—they are his undefiled works, and the mind is cast into the contemplation of eternal things.

Nature has spread for us a rich and delightful banquet. Shall we turn from it? We are still in Eden; the wall that shuts us out of the garden is our own ignorance and folly.








Stephen Tyng Mather Driving force behind the creation of the National Park Service


